Important Changes in Travis Audubon Membership

Audubon members can now choose how they want to support bird conservation. If you are interested in supporting national efforts, you can join the National Audubon Society. If you are primarily interested in protecting our local birds, wildlife, and

habitats in Central Texas, Travis Audubon is now offering a chapter-only membership—this is a membership in the Travis Audubon Society only. You can now be a member of National Audubon Society with Travis Audubon as your local chapter affiliation, or you can be a member of Travis Audubon only . . . or both! Confusing? Here's how it works.

The National Audubon Society has recently changed its relationship with local chapters. National Audubon is cutting back on the percentage of membership dues that it will share with each chapter. Currently, Travis Audubon only gets \$2.25 of your annual dues from National Audubon. Next year, we will only get a projected \$.64 for each member. This is not enough money to send out even one issue of



our newsletter (which costs nearly \$1 to print and mail to you each month). This change in policy has prompted many chapters to initiate chapter-only memberships. The main advantages of this kind of membership are that all your dues will stay local, you will continue to receive our monthly newsletter, you will receive a discount on educational classes and workshops, and Travis Audubon will not share your name and contact information with other organizations. Instead of your dues going to New York, the Travis Audubon Society will use your dues in its education, research, and conservation programs. This is how you can support the enjoyment and preservation of local birds, wildlife, and habitats here in Central Texas.

Audubon membership is flexible, however, and you need not change your current membership if you do not want to. Here are the options that are now available to you.

National Audubon Membership (with Travis Audubon as Your Local Chapter Affiliation)

When you joined the National Audubon Society, you were enrolled in the Travis Audubon Society as your local chapter. To continue with this membership option, you need not do anything. You will continue to receive the benefits of National Audubon

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

n order to further promote the enjoyment and understanding of local birds, the Travis Audubon Society has just published the latest edition of the Austin-Area Bird Checklist (see page 10). This publication is based on bird records submitted to the TAS Bird Records Committee since the publication of the last edition in 1994, and it has been more than a year in production. Jeff Hanson chaired the subcommittee working on the checklist, and Shawn Ashbaugh spent hundreds of hours putting together the graphic design and overseeing the publication. It is quite possibly the best local checklist in the state, if not the country.

Most checklists indicate either how abundant each species is or how easy each species is to find. This checklist does both. Based on an idea presented by Catfish Kelly, the checklist committee came up with an innovative system to indicate not only how many of each species should be in the area during each 10-day period of the year but also the chances that the average birder will find that species in appropriate habitat. In addition, the checklist features a map with dozens of birding locations in the Austin area. To further aid birders in finding each species, the most likely mapped locations to search are also listed.

To include all of this additional information, the checklist has been expanded from a fold-out card to a pocket-sized booklet. Thanks to everyone who contributed bird sightings and helped compile and edit the checklist. This is a valuable source of information about local birds which we can all be proud to share with our friends for years to come.







EDUCATION COMMITTEE CLASSES

Interpretive Birding Workshop Starting May 16

Have you ever been intrigued by the behavior of birds and wondered what function a specific behavior served? Would you like to add another dimension to your birdwatching? If you answered yes to either of these questions, consider taking part



in the Interpretive Birding workshop being offered in May.

We're bringing in Dr. Jim Davis, a passionate observer of avian behavior and editor of the *Interpretive Birding Bulletin*. And we're bringing him all the way from Minnesota! Jim received his Ph.D. from UT Austin and went on to work at the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute. His scientific contributions have focused on kingfisher be-

havior, including territoriality, vocal communication, and mating systems. Over the past 15 years, Jim has traveled to different parts of the world to observe and write about bird behavior. In 1997 he started the Australian edition of *Interpretive Birding Bulletin* and launched the North American edition in 2000. Check out the *Interpretive Birding Bulletin*'s website at <www.ibirding.com>.

Using an interactive style, Dr. Davis will explain the ins and outs of interpretive birding, an approach that encourages amateurs to speculate on why birds behave the way that they do and to think about what's going on in the natural world around them. The workshop's goal is to improve one's observational skills and increase the enjoyment of watching birds. Also, Jim will cover what to look for when watching behavior and offer


suggestions on how to interpret firsthand observations.

The workshop also includes an overview of the behavior of specific groups of birds such as woodpeckers, herons, and others, and it covers behavioral topics such as caching, mobbing, lekking, and vocal signaling. Since identification of species in *not* the goal, this workshop is appropriate for both advanced and novice birders.



For those participants wanting to put their newfound knowledge to the test, several field trips are planned. Jim will host small groups (limited to 12 adults) interested in watching behavior. IB outings are unique and are designed to be intellectually engaging.

Participants can choose from two op-

Avisys User's Class

Audubon Adventures Classroom Kits for grades 3–6 have been selling like hot-cakes this winter! For the 2002–2003 school year we


